On October 28 – November 22, 2013 the Library will be conducting a web-based user survey to obtain a snapshot of how we are meeting the needs of our users. The LibQual (Library Quality) survey was conducted in 2007 and 2010 and is used for comparative analysis to help identify areas of improvement or service gaps so we can to better serve our ever-changing academic community. Join us at the opening program for the ***Seeking to Tell a Story: Political Action from Slavery to Civil Rights Exhibit*** on Friday, October 18, 2013 at 10:30 AM in the Virginia Lacy Jones Exhibition Hall. Reverence Otis Moss III, pastor of Trinity United Methodist Church (Chicago, Illinois), will be the keynote speaker. The exhibit highlights black political action in Georgia related to the civil rights movement and features materials from several collections housed in the Library's Archives Research Center including the Atlanta Student Movement and Maurice Pennington Political Cartoon Collections. New e-Resources Available at the AUC Woodruff Library

The AUC Woodruff Library has recently added several new e-resources to its collection. Library users may access the resources by clicking on **Find Materials** then **Databases** links on the Library's [webpage](#).

[AccessEngineering](#)—is an engineering reference tool for professionals, academics, and students that provides seamless access to the world's most trusted collection of critical, regularly updated engineering reference information. *AccessEngineering* also comprises dynamic online features, such as instructional videos, interactive tables and charts, as well as personalization tools allowing users to organize crucial project information as they work.

[Cabell's Business Directories](#)—contains a wealth of information designed to help researchers and teaching faculty match their manuscripts with the scholarly journals which are most likely to publish those manuscripts. Directories available include *Accounting, Economics & Finance, Management and Marketing*.

[Education in Video](#)—is the first online collection of streaming video developed specifically for training and developing teachers. Containing more than 1,300 hours of teaching demonstrations, lectures, documentaries, and primary-source footage of students and teachers in actual classrooms at completion, *Education in Video* gives your education students a way to observe the intricacies of behavior, tone, facial expression, and body language that define effective teaching styles.

[Encyclopedia of Social Work](#)—is the first continuously updated online collaboration between the National Association of Social Workers (NASW Press) and Oxford University Press (OUP). This classic reference work provides a digital platform for over 400 overview articles, on key topics ranging from international issues to ethical standards.

[Oxford Biblical Studies Online](#)—provides a comprehensive resource for the study of the Bible and biblical history. The integration of authoritative scholarly texts and reference works with tools that provide ease of research into the background, context, and issues related to the Bible make *Oxford Biblical Studies Online* a valuable resource.

[Shakespeare Survey Online](#)—is an electronic yearbook of Shakespeare studies and production. Since 1948 Survey has published the best international scholarship in English and many of its essays have become classics of Shakespeare criticism. Each volume is devoted to a theme, or play, or group of plays; each also contains a section of reviews of that year's textual and critical studies, and of the year's major British performances. The virtues of accessible scholarship and a keen interest in performance, from Shakespeare's time to our own, have characterized the journal from the start. The books are illustrated with a variety of Shakespearean images and production photographs.
